Takes Honors At Amherst

Paul M. Dody, a 1955 graduate of Cranbrook School, has been named "first citizen" of Amherst college, Amherst, Mass.

The honor, known as the Pal Upsilon award and made annually, was presented by President Charles W. Cole at Senior chapel recently. Dody was selected from the members of the senior class by a committee consisting of the President, the Dean, and the Chairman of the physical education department.

Also at Senior chapel, Dody was awarded the Samuel Bowles Prize for proficiency in journalism and the Denmore Berry Collins prize in political science for submitting the best honors thesis of the year to that department.

A former scholarship student at Cranbrook, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Matwiy M. Dody, of Hamtramck.

Dody has been named to the Dean's List throughout college and recently was elected to Bond Fifteen—those 15 seniors who have attained the highest academic standing during their four years at Amherst.

He is also the recipient of a Rhodes Scholarship for study next year at Oxford, England, and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa honorary.

Civil War Hero Descendants Being Sought

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Anyone in the Birmingham-Bloomfield (Michigan) area who is descended from a Civil War soldier who won one of the first Congressional Medals of Honor?

If there is, the District of Columbia Civil War Centennial commission wants to know about it.

Paul J. Sedgwick, chairman, said the nation-wide search for the medals will be the first step in a plan to bring proper recognition to the memory of these heroes who originally earned the nation's highest award for valor. This will be done with fitting ceremony on the date in 1962 marking the centennial of Congress action in instituting the medal.

AT THE TIME of the commemorative ceremony, descendants will be invited here to participate in a special program to be held at the Washington Cathedral, recognized throughout the nation for its many symbols of heroic deeds by Americans. The program will be highlighted by an appropriate address by an outstanding orator.

Sedgwick said his idea for information concerning the whereabouts of the medals and the deeds for which they were awarded is addressed to the public at large.

"We're asking everybody to search in his attic and old trunks to uncover these medals," he announced. "We want to know where they are and who today is descended from the winners."

THE CONGRESSIONAL Medal

first was awarded survivors of the famous Andrews raid in which Federal soldiers seized a locomotive and made a dash through Confederate lines in the deep South. The engine involved, called "The General," now is the center of a debate as to its final disposition. It rests on land in Tennessee owned by the State of Georgia.

Shaped like a five-pointed star, the medal has on each of its points a crown of oak and laurel, and in its center an image of America repulsing discord in the form of two snakes surrounded by 34 stars. The clasp consists of the American eagle nestling upon two crossed cannon and a sword.
