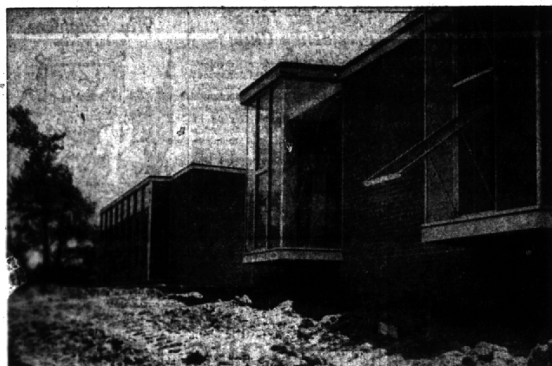


Presbyterian Congregation Names Church
