Sealed bids for the purchase of general obligation bonds to be issued by Bloomfield Hills School District No. 2, County of Oakland, Michigan, of the par value of \$790,000.00, will be received by the undersigned at Bloomfield Hills High School Building, 4200 Andover Road, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, on Tuesday, the 23rd day of June, 1959, until 8:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated June 1, 1959, will be coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, will be numbered consecutively in the direct order of their maturities from 1 to 790, both inclusive, shall bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding five per cent (5%) per annum, expressed in multiples of $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1%. Said interest will be payable on June 1, 1960, and semi-annually thereafter on December 1st and June 1st of each year, both principal and interest to be payable at a bank or trust company to be designated by the manager of the syndicate or account purchasing the bonds. Said interest rate for each coupon period on any one bond shall be at one rate only. Accrued interest to the date of delivery of such bonds shall be paid by the purchaser at time of delivery.

Said bonds will mature serially as follows:

- \$15,000.00 June 1st of each of the years 1961 to 1966, both inclusive;
- \$20,000.00 June 1st of each of the years 1967 to 1972, both inclusive;
- \$25,000.00 June 1st of each of the years 1973 to 1976, both inclusive;
- \$30,000.00 June 1st of each of the years 1977 to 1980, both inclusive;
- \$35,000.00 June 1st of each of the years 1981 to 1983, both inclusive;
- \$40,000.00 June 1st of each of the years 1984 to 1986, both inclusive;
- \$45,000.00 June 1st of each of the years 1987 to 1989, both inclusive;

Bonds numbered 1 to 340, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1961 to 1977, both inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

Bonds numbered 341 to 790, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1978 to 1989, both inclusive, may be redeemed prior to maturity at the option of the District, in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after June 1, 1974, at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, plus a premium as follows:

- \$30.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after June 1, 1974, but prior to June 1, 1978;
- \$20.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after June 1, 1978, but prior to June 1, 1982;
- \$10.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after June 1, 1982.

Notice of redemption shall be given to the holders of bonds to be redeemed by publication not less than thirty days prior to the date fixed for redemption, at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the State of Michigan which carries, as part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds. No further interest payable on bonds so called for redemption shall accrue after the date fixed for redemption, whether presented for redemption or not, providing the School District has money available for such redemption with the paying agent.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from July 1, 1959, to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the School District. Each bidder shall state in his bid the interest cost to the School District computed in the manner above specified. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or at a price less than 100% of their par value will be considered.

The said bonds are payable from ad valorem taxes to be levied without limitation as to rate or amount, as provided by Section 27, Article X of the Michigan Constitution.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$15,800.00, drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the School District must accompany each bid as a guaranty of good faith on the part of the bidder to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks, and checks of unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, attorneys of Detroit, Michigan, which opinion will be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds prior to the delivery thereof, approving the legality of the bonds. The purchaser shall furnish bonds ready for execution at his expense. Bonds will be delivered without expense to the purchaser at Detroit, Michigan.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids. Envelopes containing the bids should be marked plainly "Proposal for Bonds."

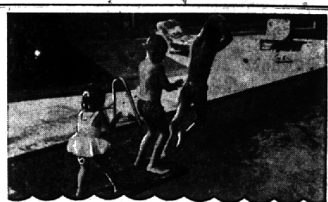
Festival Paintings To Be Exhibited At Detroit Showing

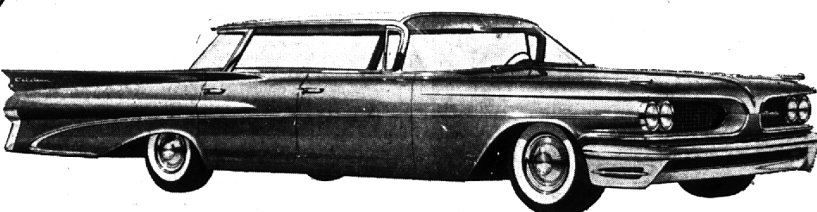

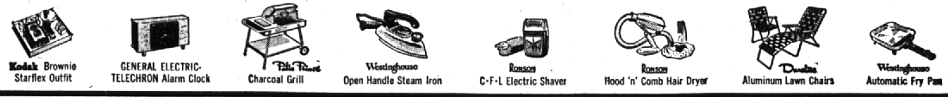
