It has been announced that Lt. Gen. Arthur G. Trudeau, USA, will deliver Cranbrook's commencement address at the 11 a.m. program, Saturday, June 13.

Gen. Trudeau has a very impressive war record. His service includes assignments in both foreign fields and the United States during World War II. He organized and commanded the fourth Engineer Amphibian brigade in 1943 and later was directed to activate and command the 4th in Manila, to support the planned assault on Japan.

TRUDEAU is a graduate of the United States Military academy and also has an MS degree in civil engineering from the University of California. Honorary doctorates have been conferred on him by Seattle University and Manhattan College.

Some of his many decorations are the Distinguished Service medal with Oak Leaf cluster, the Legion of Merit, and the Bronze star. Trudeau has received foreign decorations from Ethiopia, Belgium, the Republic of Colombia, Japan and Korea.

Upon his appointment as commander I Corps in Korea, in 1956, Trudeau was promoted to lieutenant general. In 1958 he assumed his present post as Chief of Research and Development, Department of the Army.
