Franklin Church Elects New Board of Trustees

The board of trustees of the Franklin church have elected new officers for the 1959-1960 year.

Chairman of the board is Wendell Brown, a Farmington town resident and an attorney re-elected to a three-year term on the board after several years' absence. This is the second time he has served as chairman of the board. Vice-Chairman of the board is Clark Maddock of Beverly Hills. Secretary will be Robert J. Swift, a resident of Wood Creek Village. The retiring officers are D. James Crawford, who had been chairman of the board; Arthur Hays, whose term on the board had expired, and who had been secretary while Brown had been vice chairman. The board of trustees of the church is responsible for all real estate matters, capital improvements, handling of request trusts and related items. The chairman is elected for three-year terms while the officers are elected one year at a time.
