

## Europe a Playground, Classroom for These

Bits of Birmingham will be scattered through much of Europe during the next six months as local teen-agers take part in the world's attempts at placing international relations on a personal-friendship level.

Many area youths are getting ready to leave for the continent to study, to live or just to have fun.

ONE BASIC motive behind every trip, whether sponsored by the American Field service, a church group or commercial agency, is "exchange"—the exchange of ideas and ideals.

Four local teen-agers are being sent abroad by the Michigan and Ann Arbor-Washtenaw Councils of churches, five by the American Field service, four others are going on a commercially-sponsored trip.

Two boys in the church-sponsored "Youth for Understanding" exchange program will live in Berlin one of the first time this has been permitted or attempted.

The boys were among 14 chosen by the state department from 105 Michigan youths to live in the "Schools of Democracy." Thomas Lee, son of Mr. and Mrs. David W. Lee, Pembroke road, Bloomfield Hills, and Steve Dobyns, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Dobyns, Christ Church, Cranbrook, will live in Helsinki and West Germany (or England) respectively.

SALLY WECKLER, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Weckler, Kensington road, Bloomfield Hills, is part of a choral group touring the continent under the council's sponsorship.

American Field service is sending five Birmingham high school students to Europe. Emily Watson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Watson, 1320 Latham, left for Finland, she will be a guest of Finnish families until September, first in Oulu, then in Helsinki.

4. WEED-FREE GARDENS & BORDERS:—

There are two splendid materials to control weeds in these areas from now on—after the areas are cultivated and weeded:—

(a) BUCKWHEAT HULLS

Grishy black hard hulls—water, air and food penetrate easily.

100# covers 65 sq. ft. to a 2" depth.

50# bags @ \$2.50 each.

(b) PEAT MOSS

British Columbia sphagnum moss—also good, and holds moisture.

1 bale covers 85 sq. ft. to a 1 1/2" depth.

1 Bale (6 cu. ft.) @ \$5.95 each

5. GET THE SALE SPRAYED NOW!!

6. GLADIOLUS are now 1/2 price. They can be planted for another week or so. Dust the plants with DDT (5%) until the buds show color.

7. Pinch off at the ground all but the main stalk of each dahlia.

8. Mulch the soil around sweet peas with PEAT MOSS.

9. Flowers, particularly roses, keep best if harvested late in the afternoon or evening. Plunge at once into water.

10. Pinch off the tip flowers on hollyhocks and the rest will be bigger and better.

11. Dust corn at the base of the leaves now with DDT. Later dust the ears.

12. Fertilize the asparagus patch.

13. On evergreen trees cut back undesirable leaders at this time. Leave at least an inch for setting of a new bud.

14. Leaf miners in locust, birch, etc., may be well controlled with Mc-B Insect Spray, or Isotox.

15. At first sign of potato beetles spray with DDT.

16. Put cutworm bait around the vegetables in the evening as that is when they dine.

17. Fertilize your lawn for the second time and try cutting the grass 2" high with a TORO.
