Call Sidewalks Necessity, Not Discrimination

BEVERLY HILLS—Discrimination, the residents involved call it. Necessary, the Beverly Hills village council calls the need to put sidewalks on only the east side of Fairfax for children walking to Greenfield school.

The residents, near 13 Mile, were notified recently by the village that they would have until July 1 to contract for installation of sidewalks or be included in a special assessment district to finance the walks.

Monday the village council got an answer from Richard Best, 31358 Fairfax; Peter Incandova, 31390 Fairfax; and William F. Swaney, 31436 Fairfax.

"WHY SINGLE out and discriminate against the residents of the east side of Fairfax only?" they asked.

Both sides of the street are used equally by pedestrians, they pointed out, adding that while the village was merely a baby, its elected officials didn't have "to act like children."

Before they submit to the request, the trio demanded, sidewalks should be installed on the west side also.

The council voted to go ahead with the special assessment district after Village President Martin Gline explained the details of the situation near the school showed walks were not necessary on both sides.

The need for sidewalks was declared by the village after appeals from parents of Greenfield school children. The parents protested the danger to children caused by the street to get to the school.

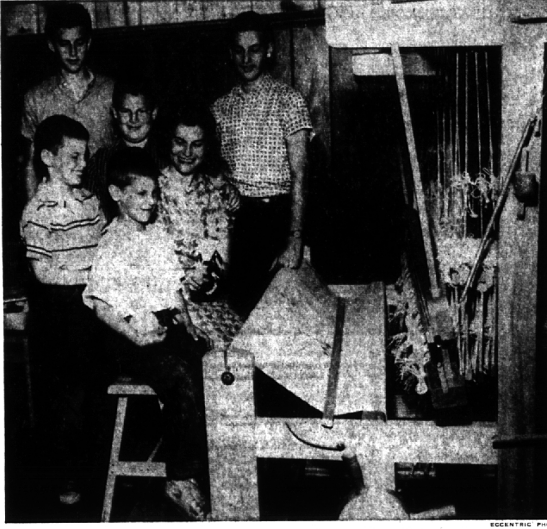

With 5 Young Masters, She Masters Fine Arts

BEVERLY HILLS—From shuttling planes to shuttling a loom—with a break between for five boys—that's the story of pretty Mrs. Harry Granader, of 18341 Warwick, Beverly Hills.

In a flying sequence reminiscent of her World War II days as a WASP pilot, Sylvia Granader was late to her own graduation ceremony Friday afternoon at Cranbrook Academy of Art. She almost missed the moment for receiving her Master of Fine Arts diploma, because sons Gary, G. Larry, 8, and Danny, 11, kept her waiting outside Beverly school.

When the all-clear from a tornado alert came and the boys were released from school, she hurried to drop them off at home, then picked up older sons Neil, 13, and Allen, 14.

The two Derby junior high school students watched their dad-haired, vicious mother receive the degree for which she had worked for two years.

THEN THEY hurried home with her for the busy time that dinner means in a family with five boys. Things have been like that ever since Sylvia Granader entered the art academy in fall, 1957, to specialize in weaving.

Even with full-time help at home, getting her master's at Cranbrook meant getting up at 6:30 Mrs. G. to get the two older boys off to their 7:20 a.m. bus. By then the three grade school boys and their father, a Detroit lumberyard owner, were up and ready for breakfast.

Daily she dropped the three youngest at school at 8:30, then hurried to Cranbrook. Home again for lunch with the grade school boys from 11:30 to 1, she returned to Cranbrook until 3:30 each afternoon.

NOW THAT she has her degree, Mrs. Granader hopes to teach weaving this fall. She had planned to teach art when she was graduated from Wayne university in 1941, with a teacher's certificate in art education. But there was a war on then, and her interest turned from art to aviation.

Her heart still does little parachute jumps over pleasant memories when she looks at a wartime picture of herself. In the picture a young, attractive girl, with a parachute strapped over her flight suit, has just jumped to smile at the camera. She is climbing into the cockpit of an Air Force training plane.

WHEN SHE completed her training at a Texas air base, the courageous miss piloted new planes from factories to air stations. Until she met a handsome pilot named Harry Granader.

Nowadays the Granaders fly only on commercial airlines, feeling unsafe and unsure of anyone else at the controls, like most ex-pilots. Granader himself took a flying jaunt to Alaska three years ago, came back with the Kodiak bear whose head and skin now grace
