The Detroit City Ballet was incorpor-The Detroit City Ballet was incorpor-ated early in 158 as a non-profit organi-zation. The present company is made up of 25 young dancers representing ballet schools of Detroit and the metro-politan area.

Two members of the company are stu-dents at Birmingham ballet schools. Jo-anne Danto studies with Barbara Seaver and Marybeth deKubinyi is a student of Irene Mortensen.

THE FIRST OF THE two ballets which the company will perform is "Concerto," choreographed by William Dollar for the Mendelssohn Piano Concerto No. 1 in G Minor, Opus 25. Accompanist will be pianist Bernard Katz. Of purely abstract conception, the ballet has no other end than to delineate grace of movement and purity of line.

The second ballet, "Soirees Musicales," was also choreographed by William Dollar to music of Rossini's Suite of Movements. The suite is designed to capture the elegance, allurement, tenderness and flamboyance of the Dance.
