## Name Stars. Area Talent Spark Show

A galaxy of "name" stars associated with the five arts will highlight the second annual Birmingham Arts Festival to be held in the Birmingham-Bloomfield area June 6 - 14.

In addition, local artists, musicians, authors, theater groups and dancers will present shows for the public during the nine-day festival.

Internationally known concert singer James Melton will headline the music program along with the Windsor Light Opera association.

MELTON WILL present a concert Tuesday, June 9, at 8 p.m. in the Bir-mingham high school auditorium.

Windsor's Light Opera association will present "Excerpts From Light Operas" at the Birmingham Community House on Friday, June 12, at 8:30 p.m.

The Birmingham Musicale will present a concert featuring local talent at 2 p.m. Thursday, June 11, at the Community House.

AN ORIGINAL musical comedy, written, produced and directed by St. Dunstan's Guild players, will be presented at the Cranbrook Greek outdoor theatre Thursday, June 11, at 9 p.m.

This satire on suburban living will headline the drama section of the Arts Festival.

The Detroit City Ballet will present two programs in one performance to headline the dance section of the Arts

This noted group will present Rossini's "Soirrees Musicales" and "Concerto in G Minor" by Mendelssohn at the Cranbrook Little Gym' on Sunday, June 7, at 8:30 p.m.

THE ART of the dance will also open the Arts Festival on Saturday, June 6, when local dance studios and their stu-dents present "Dancing on the Green" at 10 a.m. near the Quarton Falls,

He will present his lecture at the Baldwin school, Chester and Maple, Sat-urday, June 13, at 8 p.m.

A PORTRAIT painter will continue his work in the window of a downtown Birmingham store during the nine-day festival and noted sculptor, Laslo Is-panki, will open his studio to the public.

The Clawson Playhouse children's einema will present special shows. Kay Baums' and Machus Bakery will combine efforts to make a Parisian sidewalk cafe on W. Maple, reminiscent of Montmarte. Music will be publicly broadcast from Grinnell's.

A public reception will be held at the Bloomfield Art Association from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. on opening day. The BAA building is at 361 N. Woodward.
