BAA to Exhibit 'New Landscape In Art, Science'

"The New Landscape in Art and Science" headlines the Bloomfield Art Association's program for Bir-mingham's second annual Arts Festival.

PANELS OF PHOTOGRAPHS show enlarged microscopic shots of animal, vegetable and mineral forms; high speed pictures of sound, motion and electrical patterns.

ALSO INCLUDED are aerial views of the earth and telescopic views of the land which makes the first viewing strange and incomprehensible to the layman's eye.
