## Repertoire Variegated -From Carmen to Cowboys

James Melton, tenor star of opera, motion pictures, radio and television, is one of the headline events of the Birmingham Arts Festival.

He is slated to sing at the Birmingham high school, Tuesday, June 9.

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SOMETIMES STYLED "America's Favorite Tenor," Melton has won a wide following through his versatility—the wide range of his repertoire.

The tenor can make the switch from opera to classics, to ballads or folk songs with the ease of flipping a phonograph record.

He has sung leading roles at the "Met" and elsewhere in "Magic Flute", "Traviata," "Madama Butterfly," "Manon," "Don Giovanni" and other operas.

HIS VOICE has reached millions through radio and television and he has become known as a singer of cowboy songs and light classics.

Hollywood has heard of Melton. He has starred in "Sing Me a Love Song," "Stars Over Broadway," and "Ziegfield Follics."

He was chosen to appear as soloist at the inauguration of President Eisenhower, as a representative American singer.

A TALL, handsome young southerner made an immediate success on the stage of the Roxy theater, New York Melton fresh out of college, was on his way to success.

His debut was followed by a tour of Europe and America with the Revelers Quartet. Then Hollywood.

An interim tour with George Gershin had strengthened the young star's desire to establish himself as a serious artist in opera and concert.

SUMMER, 1938, saw the singer debut

at Lt. Pinkerton in "Butterfly." in Cin-cinnatti. Shortly afterward he appeared with the Chicago opera and joined the Metropolitan in 1942. His broad background supplies his concert repertoire with arias. European art songs, old English and modern Amer-ican compositions.

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Meiton, bown in Moultrie, Ga., went to school in Florida, attended the universities of Florida and Georgia and Vanderbilt.

HE DECIDED to study law at the University of Florida. After hearing his voice, Dr. Murhpree, president of the university suggested that Melton transfer to a school with a strong music department.

IN RECENT years, Melton has become internationally famous as a collector of ancient automobiles. Probably the most spectacular automotive museum in thos world is the James Melton Autorama, which opened in Hypoluxo, Pla., in 1953, housed in a luxurious eleven-acre estate. Visitors can inspect and ride in shining old cars that have been restored to earlier glory.


The collector's favorites include a 1907-Rolls Royce, which cost \$15,000 when it was new, a Stanley steamer of the same year.
