versity, is a member of Theta Xi.

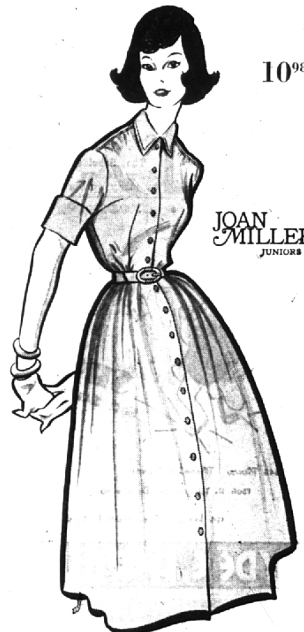
### Sorority Installed

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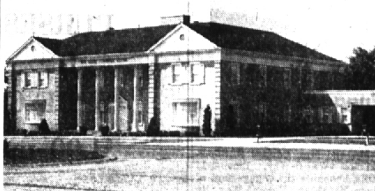
