Wright was awarded his Eaglebrook letter in varsity hockey at the talent show.

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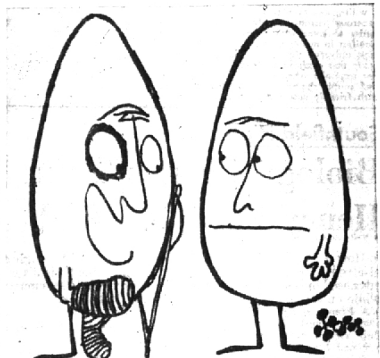
