The area bounded on the north by Redding Road, on the east by Woodward Avenue, on the south by Lincoln Avenue and on the west by the River Rouge. Registered voters residing within these boundaries will vote at Baldwin School for all school elections.

## Precinct No. 4

The area bounded on the north by Lincoln Avenue, on the east by Woodward Avenue, on the south by 14 Mile Road and on the west by the River Rouge. Registered voters residing within these boundaries will vote at Pierce School for all school elections.

## Precinct No. 5

The area included in the former Franklin School District, being that part of the Birmingham School District bounded on the north by 14 Mile

Road, on the east by the eastern boundary of the Village of Bingham Farms, on the south by the District limits and on the west by Inaker Road. Registered voters residing within these boundaries will vote at the Franklin Village School for all school elections.

## Precinct No. 6

The area bounded on the north by Quanton Road, on the east by Covington Road and South Cranbrook Road, on the south by 14 Mile Road and on the west by the district limits. Registered voters residing within these boundaries will vote at the Bloomfield Village School for all school elections.

## Precinct No. 7

The area included in the former Walnut Lake School District, being that part of the Birmingham School District bounded on the north by the district limits, on the east by the district limits, on the south by 14 Mile Road and on the west by Middlebelt Road. Registered voters residing within these boundaries will vote at the Walnut Lake School for all school elections.

## Precinct No. 8

The area bounded on the north by West Maple Avenue, on the east by the River Rouge, on the south by the Birmingham Country Club and on the west by South Cranbrook Road. Registered voters residing within these boundaries will vote at the Midvale School for all school elections.

## Precinct No. 9

The area bounded on the north by Bowers Street (both sides) west of Adams Road, Hazel Street east of Adams Road and Maple Road (east of the G.T.W.R.R.), on the east by the district limits, on the south by 14 Mile Road

on the west by Woodward Avenue. Registered voters residing within these boundaries will vote at the Torry School for all school elections.

## Precinct No. 10

The area bounded on the north by Big Beaver Road, on the east by the district limits, on the south by East Maple Road and on the west by the G.T.W.R.R. and North Adams Road. Registered voters residing within these boundaries will vote at the Pembroke School for all school elections.

## Precinct No. 11

The area bounded on the north by 14 Mile Road, on the east by Pierce Street, Beverly Road (both sides west of Pierce) and Southfield Road, on the south by the district limits and on the west by the eastern boundary of the Village of Bingham Farms. Registered voters residing within these boundaries will vote at the Beverly School for all school elections.

## Precinct No. 12

The area bounded on the north by the district limits, on the east by the district limits, on the south by Big Beaver Road and on the west by North Woodward Avenue. Registered voters residing within these boundaries will vote at the Harlan School for all school elections.

## Precinct No. 13

The area bounded on the north by the Beverly School District limits and 14 Mile Road, on the east by Greenfield Road, on the south by the district limits and on the west by the district limits. Registered voters residing within these boundaries will vote at the Greenfield School for all school elections.

Precincts No. 12 and No. 13 have been newly established, and two polling places and some boundaries have been changed to provide greater convenience for registered voters living within those areas.
