SENIOR MEN'S CLUB

The Senior Men's first club meeting of March was of unusual interest; they learned about leader dogs for the blind. Richard Vika of the organization located near Rochester, Mich., which provides such dogs, gave a very informative talk and showed the movie, "Whither Thou Goest."

Dogs accepted for training must be one or two years old, be from 24 to 26 inches tall and have the right temperament. Only 50% of those offered are acceptable and it is only about 4 out of 10 which succeed in completing the necessary 12 week course of training.

Applicants for leader dogs must become students and live at the organization's address while the proper dog is chosen and dog and man become acquainted and proficient in getting about by themselves. The cost of training a dog is \$1,500. The cost to the recipient is nothing. Including the blind person's stay in Rochester. Surely, we, the people of Michigan can be very proud of this organization and the work which they are doing. These two organizations engaged in this work, our people of Michigan who train leader dogs and those people in New Jersey who train seeing-eye dogs. 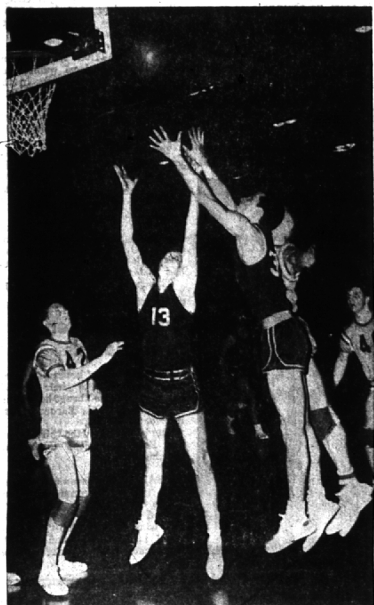
