Hawking and High Fences Regulated In Beverly Hills

BEVERLY HILLS — Hawking, peddling, and high fences will be regulated in Beverly Hills after the adoption of two ordinances which got their first reading Monday night before the village council.

A change in the zoning ordinance forbids erection of fences over four feet high, or their extension toward the lot front farther than the rear of the house. They should not be constructed of solid materials such as wood, nor equipped with barbed wire or electric current.

A public hearing on the ordinance was set for April 7.

A second ordinance restricts soliciting to charitable organizations, with a \$1 license fee established. Charging \$5 per day for licensing of peddlers, the ordinance is intended to prohibit "fly by night" organizations from door-to-door selling.

Rubbish Charge Too High, Lathrup Tells Authority

LATHRUP — Council members learned Monday evening that there will be no reduction in Lathrup's ready-to-serve charge by the Southeastern Oakland County rubbish authority.

Early in Feb. City Administrator Gerald Stone was instructed by the council to draw up a resolution protesting a ready-to-serve charge of \$292 yearly. The figure was based on an anticipated yearly tonnage of 1,320 in 1959.

At present Lathrup's rubbish amounts to only 154 tons yearly. The council authorized Stone Monday to advise the authority that they still do not agree with the figures.
