Lathrup Asks \$1.50 Per Tree For DDT Spray

LATHRUP—Residents of Lathrup Village will be asked this week to contribute \$1.50 per tree on city property for DDT spraying against Dutch Elm disease.

Since 1956 when the forestry advisory committee began its program, elm tree loss has been cut from 140 to 30 in 1958.

A bulletin to residents also suggests use of a dormant Miscible oil spray before plants set out to battle a serious infestation of scale, insects.

IN A RECENT report to the council, the tree-committee suggested that if every home owner paid for the trees adjacent to his own property, spraying could be done at 50 cents per tree and a perpetual maintenance program, including trimming, could be done.

City Administrator Gerald Stone told the council that the city truck will endeavor to pick up tree trimmings during April.

Adoption of Detroit Plumbing Code Called Big Job

LATHRUP—Time, time, who's got the time? Somebody has to find the time to read and digest the Detroit plumbing code if Lathrup is to adopt it, but it's a big job and a puzzle.

City Attorney Everett Hayes says he will write the legal language if someone will do the reading.

Hayes told the council members that the new and recently revised Detroit code has 154 pages of solid regulations and 8 pages of Michigan state plumbing laws.

WORKING must be changed to fit Lathrup Village, Hayes said, and fees will have to be set up.

Alaya Case Ruling Due Next Week

Lathrup Sets Timetable For Sewers

LATHRUP—Council members accepted Monday evening a tentative timetable for tie-in with the Evergreen interceptor.

Prepared by Mayor Richard N. Cogger, the table sets up date and steps the City of Lathrup Village must take to make connection with the completed interceptor in May, 1960.
