Soloist Featured At SOC Symphony In Oak Park

Marilyn Cotlow, lyric-coloratura, widely known both in this country and in Europe, will be guest soloist with the South Oakland County Symphony on April 4 at 8:15 p.m. in the Oak Park high school auditorium.

Miss Cotlow, who in private life, is the wife of Eugene Altshuler, member of the Detroit Symphony, lives in Oak Park. She received her early musical training in Los Angeles and first won recognition on Broadway as the heroine of Gian-Carlo Menotti's "The Telephone."

Her selection will include arias from Mozart's "The Magic Flute"; Rossini's "The Barber of Seville"; and Verdi's "La Traviata."

THE ORCHESTRA, under the direction of Henri Nosco, and composed of approximately 75 members, all living in the SOC area, will play "Danse Bacchanale" from C. Saint-Saens' "Samson & Delilah," Symphony No. 11 by Holm Matthews, a Michigan composer who will be here for the concert; and the "Overture" from "The Barber of Seville" by Rossini.

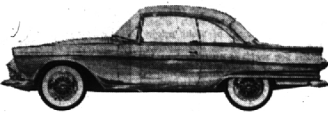

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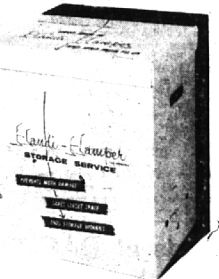
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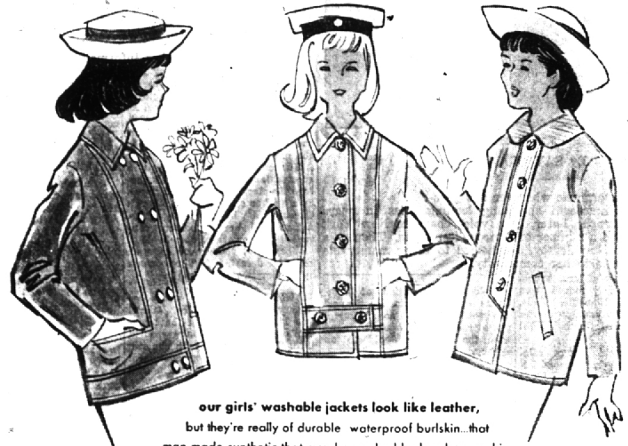


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
