

Local Residents Invited to Hear U of M Dean

Birmingham area residents will have the opportunity Monday at 8 p.m. to hear Fede F. Fauri, dean of the University of Michigan school of Social Work and professor of public welfare administration.

He will be principal speaker at the annual meeting of Family Service of Oakland county to be held at Bloomfield Hills high school, West Long Lake at Anderson.

Dean Fauri is a native of Michigan and a former director of the Michigan department of Social Welfare. He obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1930 and a Bachelor of Law degree in 1933 from the University of Michigan.

AFTER SERVING four years as director of the Michigan Department of Social Welfare, he went to Washington to serve as senior specialist in social legislation for the Legislative Reference Service of the Library of Congress, from where he was detailed to many major jobs.

Dean Fauri is currently president of the Council on Social Work Education and is chairman of the Federal Advisory Council on Employment Security.

The purpose of Family Service of Oakland county is to promote the services and participate in the community planning which will develop and preserve wholesome family life.

The agency offers counsel to individuals needing help in making a satisfactory adjustment within themselves and within their environment.

FAMILY SERVICE also shares in developing the social services necessary in the locality, in the co-operative working relationships between the various agencies and community leaders, and in the education process essential to an informed and vital area.

Dean Fauri's address will be the highlight of the event marking the ninth annual meeting of the Agency.

Mrs. Noel Buckner, president of the board of directors, will preside and introduce the new executive director, Robert James. Robert Snyder will present the names of new board members. The treasurer's report will come from John W. Hiringer, managing director, Pontiac Chamber of Commerce.

Following Dean Fauri's address there will be an informal reception and social hour. Refreshments will be served by volunteers from the Birmingham Junior League.
