Symphony, Ballet Delight Children

The Detroit symphony orchestra and the Severo ballet presented a delightful program Saturday to an attentive audience, young and old, at the last of this year's Young People's Concerts in Ford auditorium.

The orchestra, under the direction of Valter Poole, played the Andante cantabile from Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 5. With the Severo ballet group it presented "Swan Lake" by Tchaikovsky, and an original ballet created by Sandra Severo and David MacLaine based on the score of Benjamin Britten's "A Young Person's Guide To The Orchestra."

"Swan Lake" is a difficult work for the most exalted company to perform adequately. The featured dancer admirably Saturday by Carolyn Borys, runs the full technical and emotional gamut for a ballerina.

Watching this young dancer meet some of the role's challenges with noticeable difficulty at times, made even more apparent the severity of its demands. However, Miss Borys showed fine feeling throughout and has obviously reached a high technical plateau.

THE CORPS, who also danced with a feeling, did very well in moments that can shake the very best. This arrangement of "Swan Lake," purposely made for a young audience, in no way destroyed the pictorial or musical continuity of the work.

The Severo group and the Detroit symphony should be applauded for bringing a work of this

sophistication and complexity to the notice of young people. When confronted with them, they inevitably respond happily and willingly to great works of art.

The actual presentation of the afternoon, the ballet based on Britten's score, turned out to be a charming and imaginative setting of somewhat ponderous music. The costumes by Wilmer Weiss and Helem Markovitch were particularly effective in capturing a pictorial conception of the sound of the choreography was clever in delineating a carefully anthropomorphized approach of the individual instruments.

THE AUDIENCE was obviously enchanted by it all, and so this year's Young People's series ended on a happy and successful note. The performances as usual were at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. I wondered as I looked around at the many vacant seats during the matinee whether everything was being done to bring children from the public schools to these wonderful, direct experiences with musical art.

When fine programs such as this are made available by the orchestra, then it would seem to be up to the schools to see that they are attended by the greatest possible number of eager young minds.
