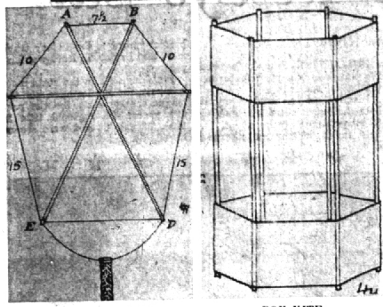

Contestants Ready Kites for Flying

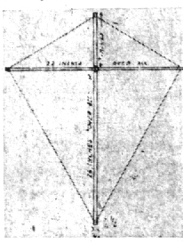
Planning on making your own kite to enter in the Bloomfield Art Association Recreation department flying contest on Saturday, April 4, at Poppleton park?

The above diagrams for kites are the most popular and have given the best results in previous kite contests, according to the kite experts.

A TWO-STICK kite is the most simple and often brings the best results while a three-stick kite is more sturdy. The most difficult of all to make is the box kite. The best feature of the box kite comes to fore in heavy, strong winds.

Winners of the Bloomfield Art Association's design contest held Sunday were announced by Association officials. Herbert McConnell, 2647 Dorchester, Bloomfield Hills, won the grand prize in the senior division. McConnell, associated with the Guided Missile division of Chrysler corporation, worked with his son, Bobby, to enter the contest. They modeled their kite after the delta-wing plane.

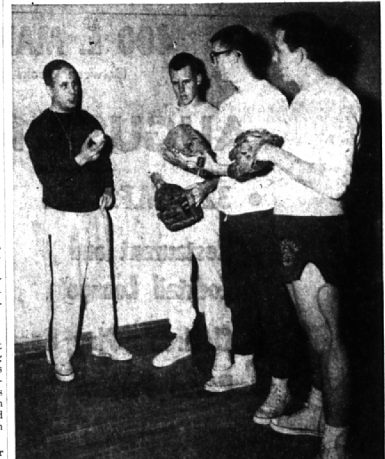

Present Archery Champions Return For Tournament

Eleven past and present national champions are among the 268 entries already received from throughout the nation for the \$7,000 indoor archery tournament to be held this Saturday and Sunday, at the State Fair Grounds coliseum in Detroit.

To be known as the Ben Pearson Open, the tournament will be the largest indoor archery event ever held anywhere both in prizes and number of entries. FORTY four-man teams from nine different states, ranging geographically from New York to California, also have filed entries for that phase of competition in which they will be shooting for a top cash award of \$1,000. Individual competition will be separated into three groups each day, shooting at 10 a.m., 1 p.m. and 4 p.m. The four-man teams will be in action at 8 p.m. each night.

Conservation Asks Change In Deer Rules

LANSING, Mar. 26—Legislation proposed to liberalize deer hunting regulations about the Straits was endorsed by the Conservation commission during its March 13 formal meeting in Lansing.

Conservation department officials are drafting a proposal to establish a party permit system in the upper peninsula replacing the present camp permit method. When completed, the proposal will be submitted to House conservation committee chairman Hans Rasmussen of Ludington.

THE SYSTEM, paralleling one used in Wisconsin, would permit each party, composed of four or more hunters, to bag one deer of any sex in excess of the regular one-buck limit during the open season.

The current arrangement allows hunters to harvest one male deer, per camp, above the normal limit. Special seasons, based on areas and their quotas, would remain in effect.
