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of the village of Franklin have authority to raise a special tax of up to \$8 per thousand of the assessed valuation of all real property in the village.

Franklin traffic is now such that road conditions must be improved, and funds from the state cannot begin to meet the need, village officials point out. As far as places where Franklin residents can put their money, here is one expenditure which should mean added convenience, automotive economy and even some saving of time to village dwellers.

A third Franklin proposal would amend the village charter so that special assessment districts could be created to finance road improvements, and the village may borrow money "in anticipation of the payment of special assessments" set up for road construction.

The same charter amendment to facilitate road improvement through special assessment districts and to permit borrowing for that purpose is proposed for Bingham Farms. Adoption of these measures would set up machinery whereby a considerable amount of much-needed road improvement could be financed. This newspaper believes that Bingham Farms and Franklin voters would benefit from a "yes" vote on these proposals.

City's voters approve a similar one April 6, the township water system would then be split between Westwood and Southfield city.

The measure has been called "sound economically" by the Westwood council. Dr. Wood said Monday, "Audits of the township water department over the years show that definitely."

HE SAID the cost for dividing the system would be nil, since Westwood is already on separate metering.

"The system is something that we already own," Dr. Wood said. "We think it proper that our local government take over the running of it."

With continued township ownership, Bingham Farms and Franklin, which have no public water, would have a voice in the running of the water system.

IN OTHER business Monday, the council set for April 7 a public hearing on a request from 12 residents for upgrading their property from R-3 to R-5 zoning. Lots involved are in an area bounded by Evergreen, Riverside, the Rouge river and 14 Mile road.

The council heard a report from Councilman Shurtliff that measurements were being taken of catch basins in the area where basement flooding is likely. The village seeks to have catch basins covered made to stop the cellar flooding. Getting the dimensions is difficult, he said, because many of the catch basins are still covered with snow.

In connection with possible village regulation of fence height and type, the council voted to ask as association heads to advise them of any existing subdivision fence restrictions.
