1 Dead, 9 Injured In Head-on Crash On N. Adams Road

NORTH ADAMS — A 29-year-old mother of three children died and nine others were injured Sunday in a head-on collision on Adams road, north of Square Lake road.

Marilyn Boone, 29, of 46 N. Francis, Pontiac, died at 4 p.m. Sunday, the cause of her death. Her husband, Raymond, is reported in "apprehensive-fair" condition.

Their 12-year-old son, Jim, is also in "fair" condition. Three-year-old Kenneth and two-year-old Leonard Boone were treated for cuts and bruises and released.

DR. ALBERT P. ULRICH, 47, driver of the second car, was reported in "poor" condition. He lives at 5670 Sussex street, Troy. Ulrich was driving south with four other passengers and the Boones were heading south when the accident occurred.

According to Oakland county sheriff's officials, the cause of the accident is still undetermined.

Ulrich's son Carl, 10, and Sam Lieberman, 10, of 18851 Crutcher, Detroit, are both in "fair" condition.

The gang admitted 21 jobs in Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Hazel Park, Huntington Woods and Troy. Clark and McFarland have worked together more than the others—racked up the largest part of the total.

wherever appropriate, in the delivery of services and facilities according to need.

IN THE COURSE of its activities over a year and a half, the Youth Committee discovered needs, learned facts, and gained impressions about our community.

It saw the community character as a major influence upon the children. It heard that many parents are concerned about the best ways to bring up their children.

It observed that other parents were caught up in the swirl of high-pressure living and did not find enough time to guide their youngsters during critical growth periods.

THE YOUTH COMMITTEE, in its role of studying, analyzing and stimulating action, has attempted to determine needs and investigate various solutions, keeping in mind program, purposes and facilities available and organizations in the area.

Programs which the committee recommends for continuation and development are: Law and order, a drop-in program for juveniles, and programs for hot rod clubs.

In regard to areas recommended for further exploration, the committee says: Help youth to help themselves.

"We feel that the youth committee should investigate the possibilities of an employment service for young people. A job training program for young people, such as a service.

"We recommend continued exploration of ways to promote satisfying, happy family living. One area of interest is providing programs in which families can participate together.

"One interesting reading indicates a 'high pressure' area of personality problems within a segment of high school and college people. There is a need to explore further the extent of personality problems within this group.

"WE SHOULD explore the participation and relationship of volunteer lay workers with professional leaders in community planning and programming.

"Our community needs to study the kind and number of facilities needed for present and future activities.

"We feel there is a need for promoting additional pre-marital education and counseling."
