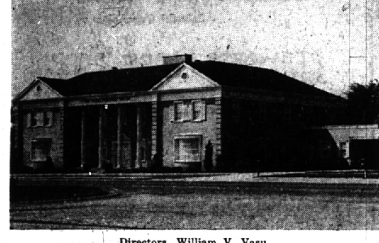


BITS OF BIRMINGHAM

8 Candidates File For School Board

Five last-minute candidates for the two four-year Birmingham school board posts swelled the number of hopeful trustees to eight this week for the June 10 election.

Mrs. Dean Beier, 1509 Dorchester, is unopposed in her bid for the one-year unexpired portion of the seat she was appointed to fill last January.

SCHOOL BOARD president Mrs. Peter Loomis, 1648 Dorchester, and seven new candidates are vying for the two open seats.

Mrs. Loomis' term expires this June and another seat was opened by the retirement of Amos F. Gregory, 1215 Dochester, who served on the board 15 years.

Candidates for the posts are Paul H. Allen, 1734 Villa Birmingham; George W. Coombe, Jr., 4412 Parklane court, Bloomfield township; George J. Fulkerson, 3011 Middlebury lane, Bloomfield township; and Albert H. Giuliani, 1576 Chatham, Birmingham.
 Also running for the seats are Richard L. Halsted, 1235 Cedar; Granville C. Ryan, 550 W. Doberman; and Theodore J. Szymke, 1116 Buckingham, all of Birmingham.

MRS. LOOMIS was first appointed to the school board in 1948 to fill a vacancy. She was first elected to a full, four-year term in 1955 and is elected president of the board last July.

Allen, 40, a salesman for the Wilson sporting goods company, attended the University of Michigan and served in the air force during World War II.
 He is married, has five children and has lived in Birmingham 33 years. He is a past president and now treasurer of the Birmingham association for handicapped children and on the city advisory committee of the Oakland county special education association.

COOMBE, 34, is an attorney for General Motors and a graduate from Cleveland law school. A World War II veteran, Coombe is active in the Sunday school work at First Presbyterian church and PTA work at Harlan school.
 He is also a member of the English curriculum subcommittee of the Birmingham PTA studying the local school curriculum.

Fulkerson, who ran for the school board in 1957, is a practicing attorney. He is married and has three children. A graduate of the University of Chicago, he received his law degree from the University of Detroit.
 Giuliani, 36, is treasurer of the Rochester Paper company, and has lived in Birmingham for seven years. A CPA, he was elected to the Birmingham school board in 1958.
