Admission tests will be given at 9 a.m. Saturday, May 23, to those who have made formal application.

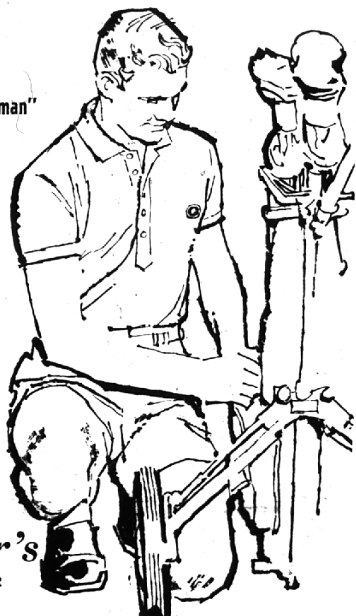

Thirty-three nations took part in an international stamp exhibition in Tel Aviv, Israel.



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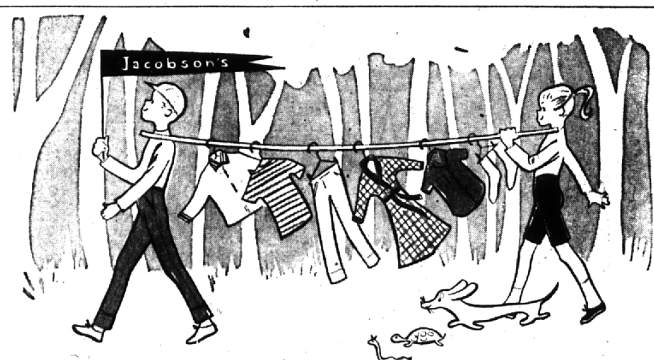


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
