Setting two new records, the Maple track team ran to a fifth place finish in the third annual Dick Waters relay. Birmingham beat off Farmington, which finished eighth. Grosse Pointe won the meet with 40%, while Birmingham had 18.

BILL ALCOORN won his specialty at 13 ft. 2 in. breaking the mark of 12 ft. 7 in. a record he set in 1957 at Monroe. The shuttle hurdle relay team of Doug Booth, Paul Robertson, Nigel Lock and Boyd Mayhew finished fifth but set a new school record in 1:01.8.

The old mark of 1:01.8 was set in 1958 by Rolfe McGinnis and Boynton, Mac Booth, and Bob Littlejohn.

Sealed bids for the purchase of Oakland County Sewage Disposal Bonds—Farmington System by the County of Oakland, Michigan, of the par value of \$5,748,000 will be received by the undersigned, at the office of the Board of Public Works of said County, No. 100 South Telegraph Road in the City of Pontiac, Michigan, until 11:00 o'clock A.M., Eastern Standard Time, on Tuesday, the 26th day of May, 1969, at which time and place said bids will be opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated April 1, 1969, will be coupon bonds in the denomination of \$1,000 each, will be numbered consecutively in the direct order of their maturities from 1 to 5,748, both inclusive, and will bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding 6% per annum, payable on November 1. Each and thereafter semi-annually on May 1 and November 1. Each bid shall state the annual interest rate or rates upon which it is submitted, expressed in multiples of 1/4 of 1%. The interest rate for each coupon period on any one bond shall be at one rate only. Accrued interest to date of delivery of said bonds must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

Said bonds will mature serially as follows:

Bonds maturing prior to May 1, 1975 will not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. Bonds maturing on and after May 1, 1975, from time to time outstanding, will be subject to redemption as a whole at the option of the county prior to maturity on any one interest payment date on and after May 1, 1974. Bonds called for redemption shall be redeemed at the par value thereof and accrued interest plus a premium on each bond in accordance with the following schedule:

\$30 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1974 but prior to May 1, 1976

\$25 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1976 but prior to May 1, 1978

\$20 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1978 but prior to May 1, 1980

\$15 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1980 but prior to May 1, 1982

\$10 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1982 but prior to May 1, 1984

\$5 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1984

Notice of redemption shall be published not less than 30 days prior to the date fixed for redemption, at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the City of Detroit, Michigan, which carries a general notice of the sale of municipal bonds.

Both principal and interest will be payable at such bank and/or trust company as shall be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds. Such purchaser shall have the right to name a co-paying agent.

The bonds are to be issued for the purpose of defraying the cost of acquiring the Farmington Sewage Disposal System. They are to be issued pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 188 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1957 in anticipation of the payment of the amounts to be paid to the county under a certain contract dated November 1, 1967, as amended, between the County of Oakland and the Township of Farmington, Township of West Bloomfield, the City of Southfield and City of Keego Harbor, whereby each of said municipalities agreed to pay to the said county a certain percentage of the capital cost of the Farmington Sewage Disposal System in 30 annual installments beginning April 1, 1960. The aggregate of the several amounts to be so paid is \$5,748,000 plus interest. Pursuant to the resolution authorizing the issuance of said bonds, adopted by more than 3/5ths vote of the members elect of the Board of Supervisors of Oakland County, the full faith and credit of said county is pledged for the prompt payment of the principal of and interest on the said bonds.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total of all interest on the bonds from June 1, 1969, to their respective maturities and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above comparison produces the lowest interest cost to the county. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or at a price less than their par value, will be considered.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$115,000 drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the County of Oakland must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of the unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Dickson, Wright, Davis, McKean & Gedlin (Claude H. Stevens, of Counsel), attorneys, Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the bonds. The cost of legal opinion as of the printing of the bonds will be paid by the County. There will also be furnished the usual closing papers, including a non-litigation certificate, dated as of the date of the delivery of the bonds. Bonds will be delivered at New York, N. Y., or Chicago, Ill., at the option of the purchaser.

The right is reserved to reject any or all bids.

Envelopes containing the bids should be plainly marked "Proposal for Farmington Bonds."
