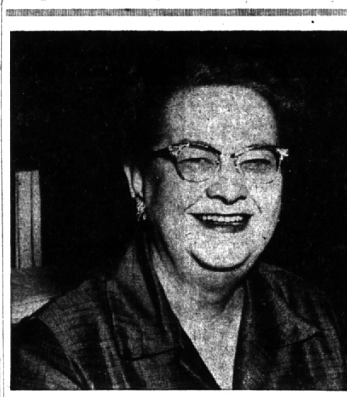
Panhellenic Plans Bridge Tournament

Lola Quay Plans New 'Career of Retirement'

Lola Quay, writer, actress and one-time secretary to Walter P. Chrysler, has embarked on a "career of retirement" after completing nearly 33 years of service with Chrysler Corporation.

"I like to think of retirement," says Miss Quay, "not as the last chapter in my life, but as the beginning of a new chapter in living. There are many things I still want to do and I intend to do just as many of them as I can."

JUDGING FROM her busy years with the company, she will accomplish all of her retirement with ease.

MISS QUAY entertains no thoughts of moving to warm climates. Born in New Castle, Ind., she adopted Michigan and intends to remain here in her Birmingham home at 655 North Eton road.

She will continue writing at a leisurely pace and will resume little theater activities which she has not had time for in recent years.

Miss Quay joined Chrysler Corporation on August 15, 1926.

She recalls particularly the year 1927 when she served as secretary to Mr. Chrysler.

She literally played many roles at the company. Knowing she was a talented amateur actress, Mr. Chrysler asked her in 1928, to organize a group of players. She did and for the next two years served as its president.

Her best-known role, however, was one she created herself in the person of "Molly McFar," a character she wrote into a book called "Parts, Methods and Management." The book served as a vitally important handbook for people who filled in for regular employees during World War II. The nickname, "Miss McFar," is still affectionately used by former associates.

AT THE TIME of her May 1 retirement, Miss Quay was supervisor of the McFar sales and advertising department. While most of her automotive career has been devoted to the development and distribution of parts advertising and related material, her activities were by no means confined to this area.

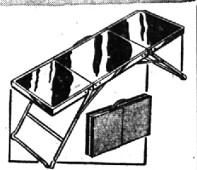
