Six Area Golf Clubs Make All-Star List

One of the state's top amateur golfers was asked to pick out the Michigan all-star 18 hole golf course for Motor News recently and Chuck Kocsis selected six of the 18 holes from the Birmingham area.

Kocsis qualified his selections with the statement that the rating of golf holes is a highly personal matter and that no two golfers ever see the same things in a hole. For his first hole, Kocsis selected Franklin Hills' seventh, 427 yard par four, because of its beauty and deceiving appearance.

HE PICKED the fifth, par four 440-yard hole at Orchard Lake for his second and the Pine Lake 11th for his seventh hole. The eighth at Tam O'Shanter was fitted in to that slot of the all-star 18 because it was a par three, 241-yard hole.

The famous 10th hole, which is a par four, 448-yard test at Oakland Hills was placed as the 10th on the all-star list and the par four, 465-yard fourth hole at Birmingham was placed as the 14th hole.

THAT 10TH hole at Oakland Hills first became famous in 1928 when it cost Bobby Jones his Open title. Jones scored 6-6-5 on that hole during the tournament.

When Jones came back for a visit a few years later, he played a friendly round with head pro Al

(Continued from Page 1-E) explaining the need for additional funds to PTA gatherings, and the PTA council is giving strong support to the schools in their bid for additional funds.

Last year Southfield schools' total millage was 18.46. The amount included 9.28 mills allocated for operation by the county, plus the three-mill voted increase, plus 6.08 mills voted for retirement of building debts.

The school board's brochure points out that the schools provide free transportation and textbooks, while still operating at a lower tax rate than for many surrounding school districts.

THE ADDITIONAL millage is needed now the brochure explains, "to complete successfully in teacher recruiting, improve teachers' salaries, in expanding and improving curriculum, to meet costs of increased school plant operation and to fund the present operating budget deficit."

Many people believe we should have something more tangible to point to with pride regarding our schools, "that the brochure" states the fact that we are maintaining one of the lowest tax rates in Oakland county, especially if we are interested in good education results.

Asked what services would have to be curtailed if the increase did not go through, Schoenhals said it was not determined.

DEADLINE for registering to vote in the school election is Friday, May 22, at 5 p.m. with the clerks of Southfield, Lathrup village, or Southfield township, Michigan, or municipality of the voter resides in.

A highly contested race for seats on the school board is also expected June 8. Unsuccessful candidates in last year's school election, John G. Campbell and Ernest J. Coverdill, both of Lathrup are running for a three-year term.

Kenneth Karakostas, Gordon C. Henderson, Leta Larson, and Sol Siegel have filed for the four-year term.

She and her two pre-school brothers kept things so busy that neither mom or dad heard about the city celebration until it was too late to attend.

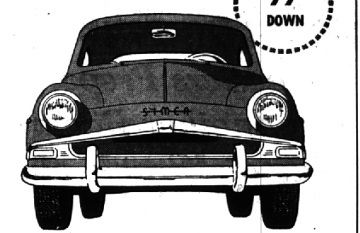

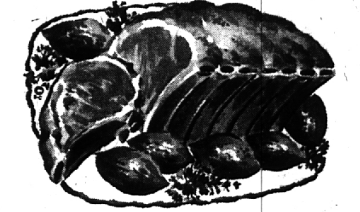
