Tell your story. Give the editor all the facts and necessary details, including full names and addresses of local persons involved and identifying titles. Be an impartial, dependable and discriminating news source.

Following these basic rules will go far in getting any editor to welcome you with open arms:

1. Type your story, double spaced, on one side of an 8 1/2 by 11 1/2 sheet of paper. Stories written in longhand invite errors, and few editors have time to telephone for translations!

2. At the top of the sheet type your name, address, telephone number, the subject of your publicity (such as EZ Club Meeting), and the date on which it may be released.

3. Keep the story short—one page if possible. Avoid adjectives and the glowing tribute—they're out of date and no longer acceptable. Don't write headlines. That's the editor's job.

4. Get your story to the editor as soon as possible. Most news printed in the women's or society section can be written well in advance of a planned event. If the editor has it early, she will be able to give it more time and to follow-up, through you, any aspects of the story which seem of particular interest.

5. NEVER wait until five minutes before the deadline to bring your story in. The final deadline for this section of The Birmingham Eccentric is Tuesday at 12 noon. A wise publicity chairman will have her story on the editor's desk well ahead of Tuesday's deadline.

6. Make sure you get a picture, that it is a newsworthy, interesting, important picture which your organization can provide. Picture deadline for the women's section of the paper is the Friday noon preceding publication of the following Thursday paper.

Remember that these policies have a purpose. A newspaper is a business. Order, organization and system are important. Schedules must be met. Our job is to produce a paper which you want to read.

You can help us greatly in our job by adhering closely to these rules. And we'll be happy to help you all we can in your new job as publicity chairman!
