**Pay Raise Is \$9,300,
 Hills Teachers Show**

The board of directors, the salary committee, and the professional improvement committee of Bloomfield Hills education association, a teacher organization, met Tuesday to discuss the salary schedule for teachers in the Bloomfield Hills school system for 1959-'60 as approved by the board of education.

The group voted to carry out instructions from the education association that detailed figures of the salary schedule be made available to the public.

A request was made immediately to The Birmingham Eccestric to publish a detailed analysis.

ACCORDING to figures released by the association, the aggregate raise to teachers in 1959-'60 is only \$9300 more than it would have been if they had been computed on the basis of last year's salary contracts.

The board of education has given its figures \$40,000 for increases in teachers' and principals' salaries.

Starting salaries of \$4600 for B.A. teachers and \$4800 for M. A. teachers remain the same.

Other than a \$100 raise in the maximum salary paid teachers after 12 years tenure—\$7100 for B.A. \$7300 for M.A. teachers—any raises in pay for next year have been made through a raise in the increment schedule. This is the rate of annual pay increases guaranteed the teachers, based on years of service in the school system.

SINCE 1957, the increment has been a straight \$200 for each year of service until the maximum salary is reached.

For 1959-'60 the board has set up a graduated increment scale instead of a straight \$200 yearly raise.

Increment after the first and second years of teaching remains at \$200; after the third year: \$240; fourth year: \$260; fifth year: \$280; from the sixth year until the maximum salary is reached: \$300.

The increment schedule for next year in relation to the increment schedule in effect this year, means no increase in pay to 31 teachers; 68 teachers will receive from \$40 to \$100 more, and 38 teachers will receive raises of \$100. The total amount of raises, thus computed, is \$9300.
