Through the sponsorship of Dr. and Mrs. Otto Grob of Parkstone Lane in the Berkshires, Eva and Steven recently were brought to the United States. It has taken the Grobs years of patience and determined effort to get them here.

Dr. Grob first got acquainted with Eva when she became the step-daughter of Dr. Grob's sister, Mrs. Magda Oetovs. Mrs. Oetovs married a widower, and Eva was one of his children. Mr. and Mrs. Oetovs are still behind the Iron Curtain in Hungary.

The hardships under which Eva got her education in Hungary make Birmingham area pupils' "trying" problems look simple by comparison.

When EVA went to school, she would rise at 4 a.m., walk three miles to catch a train for Pees. During sub-zero weather it was

While Eva was studying in Pees, she became engaged to Steven. They were both medical students. During the Revolution they fled Hungary and went to Yugoslavia. From there they were admitted to Belgium, where they were married and continued their studies at the Louvain University for a year and a half.

ALL DURING this time the Grobs were trying to secure entrance for them to the United States. Last January their prayers were finally answered.

Because they arrived here in the middle of the school year, and because they must improve their English, Eva and Steven must wait until September before entering Wayne State University to continue their studies in medicine. At the moment Eva is working in the pathological laboratories at Children's hospital. Steven is working in the operating room at Florence Crittenton Hospital.

Although Eva is only 24 and Steven 25, they are already very full lives.

We wish them the happy life in our country which they so richly deserve.
