**Cranbrook Beats RR In Relays**

Cranbrook's track team, which meets Birmingham tomorrow afternoon, returned to the spotlight this week with a brilliant victory in the Central Michigan Relays held in Mount Pleasant Saturday.

The Central relay and mile relay teams took first in the relays as they piled up 41 points in the meet. River Rouge will run tied for second with 36 each.

THE CENTRAL relay team of Henry Hoffman, Barnie Grouse, Dave Frey and Larry DeWitt brought in one first as did the mile relay team of Henry Hoffman, Ted Seyfarth, Gary Cameron and DeWitt.

The mile relay team set a new record with a 3:33.3 timing. Two all-important second places were taken by the two-mile relay team of Roland Kaplan, Dave Fox, George Galloway and Rick Williams.

Their record-breaking time of 8:33.6 wasn't enough for a first however.

THE SHUTTLE relay team also came in second with Bill Vasu, John Cuff, Tod Williams and John Butzel sharing the 800 and John Ogden brought in extra points when he placed third in the mile while fifth places were garnered by John Hayden in the short put and Barney Grouse in 100-yard dash.

Cranbrook tuned up for the relays by using Kennedy of Canada as a sounding board earlier in the week, 93-25.

The only first gathered by Kennedy was in the pole vault.

BUTZEL won the high hurdles, Crouse the 100-yard dash, Ogden the mile, Hoffman the 440, Rick Williams in the 800 and Bob Graham in the shot put.

Crosby also swept first in the 220 and broad jump events while Butzel repeated in the low hurdles. The Cranes were not so fortunate in other events as the tennis team bowed to Cleveland University school, 3-2, but crushed Oak Park earlier in the week, 6-3, and the baseball team suffered two straight defeats.

ONLY THE doubles team could dent C.U.S. as Chuck Cudlip and Ron Reider dumped their opponents, 6-4, 6-4, as did Marvin Bookstein and Tom Goff, 6-4, 6-3.

Tom Bray and Ed Sun paced the Cranes to a shutout of Oak Park by trouncing their opponents with the identical scores of 6-2, 6-2.

Of the 217,553 Michigan watercraft registered by the Department of State last year, 17,600 of them were from Oakland county.

According to James M. Hare, Secretary of State, 4,031 boats licensed for use on Michigan's inland waterways were owned by out-of-state owners.
