McNutt was called upon to make a detailed accounting of funds spent in the last three months, with emphasis upon \$11,000 spent for equipment rental without specific council approval.

McNUTT WAS taken off the carpet in the four-hour Saturday session, and a monthly budget meeting was set up to prevent further confusion and misconceptions.

Wuerfel called attention to the fact that McNutt was forced to report at a public meeting covered by the press. In a business, Wuerfel said, the matter would have been handled at a private meeting.

Township Votes Accident Insurance For Police, Fire

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—Police and fire volunteer firemen in Bloomfield township will be protected, while on duty, by accident insurance provided by the township.

The decision was reached Monday night at a meeting of the township board. It will cost the township approximately \$600.

At the same time, the board discussed and legal aspects of providing insurance protection for full-time township policemen and firemen. Action on this matter possibly be taken at the next regular meeting, Nov. 23.

THE ACCIDENT policy covering auxiliary policemen and volunteer firemen will implement workman's compensation and benefits, which are slim in these classifications.

The policy provides \$5,000 death and dismemberment, \$2500 medical expenses and disability payments up to two years.

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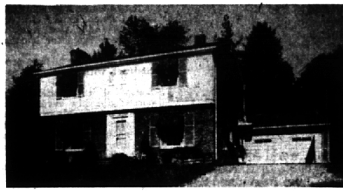

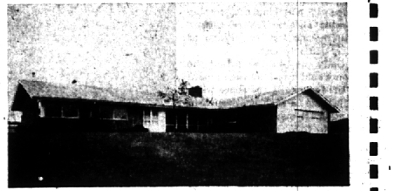
