S'field Schools Eye Purchase Of Army Land

SOUTHFIELD — School board members must decide within the next month if they want a 16-acre army surplus Nike site just north of 11 Mile road, two miles west of Telegraph.

Superintendent Glenn Schoenhals told board members he feared the section might be zoned for heavy industrial buildings, but since the offer was made to the school district, he has been informed that the planned zoning is for light industry and commercial.

There are a few strings tied to the offer. Schoenhals admitted, but looking ahead he foresees the need for a school on the land. If the board accepts the property, they will be bound to build there on it within eight years, or the property will revert back to the government. If they build within eight months they can get it free, but funds are not available.

COST OF the site will be five per cent of the appraised value and five percent interest on the unpaid balance. Maximum payment would be \$37,000.

The school district now owns eight acres of land nearby which could be sold to defray the cost of the larger site. Large pieces of property suitable for a school and playground are becoming scarce in Southfield, board members noted.
