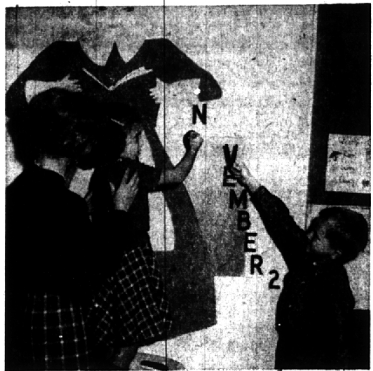


Beverly Students Observe Education Week

when his father represented a German firm exporting steel to Japan.

THE HEADMASTER returned to Japan as a delegate of the Comparative Education society with the assignment to study schools and gifted child education. He saw elementary schools with separate science rooms, with adequate equipment for children as young as fourth grade. He saw algebra and geometry being taught in some schools from sixth grade on, and modern languages from seventh grade on.

He feared that children there are assigned two to three hours' homework a day during the summer vacation. All of which seems to keep the students too busy for "socializing."

THERE IS little socializing and no dating going on between boys and girls up through high school, and on the college level it is limited, Roesper reports.

All Japanese parents beseech children to get into the National Government of private schools which are the better schools. They are attended by about 80 per cent of the child population.

To get into the National schools, children must pass rigid examinations. Says Roesper, "The subjects are always goes up at examination time."

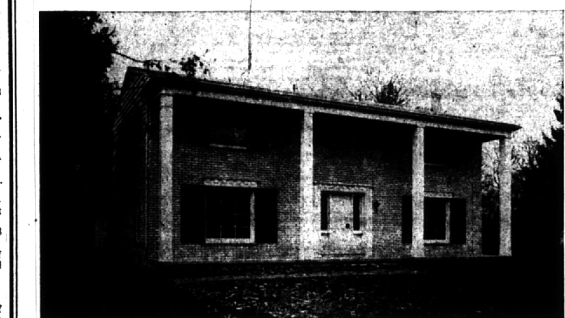

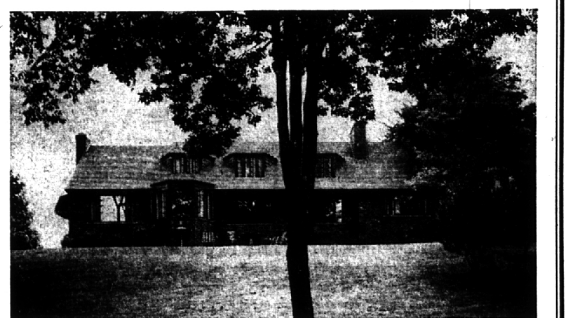

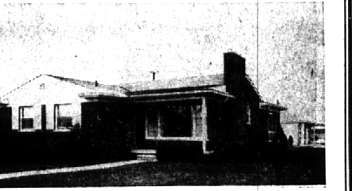
