They Weren't the Best, But Were They Close

Twenty-seven seniors at the Ernest W. Seaholm High School in Birmingham have been cited for outstanding performance on the National Merit Scholarship qualifying test (NMSQT) last spring. Each received a formal "letter of commendation" from the National Merit Scholarship corporation.

Principal Ross A. THE NATIONAL Merit Scholarship corporation gives recognition to two groups of students who achieve high scores on the National Merit Scholarship qualifying test. The first is the group of semi-finalists which was announced several weeks ago. Seaholm High School had 22 students in this previous semi-finalist test. "Letters of commendation" are sent to 27,000 students from all over the United States in recognition of high performance on the National Merit Scholarship qualifying test, and is the second group to be recognized.

ALTHOUGH these students did not score high enough to become semi-finalists in their states, and

are no longer considered for Merit Scholarships, they do on the basis of their test scores, show unusual promise.

Both the semi-finalists and this group together constitute less than three per cent of all the high school seniors throughout the nation.

A significant fact as it pertains to the local situation is that while these two groups represent only three per cent of the seniors in the nation, the 48 students honored at Seaholm High School represent 7.3 per cent of the local senior class.

There is evidence that mental retardation is on the increase following the current pattern of the growing population trend. It is a fact that some of the children born today will be mentally retarded, hence the natural increase. Add to this a number of other children who will later become mentally retarded due to injury or illness, and the picture that first appears rather disheartening. The Michigan association for retarded children and its chapters is meeting the increasing challenges head on.

Common enemies of progress are ignorance, superstitions and willful apathy, but through programs of public education and the willing cooperation of parents, MARCH is eventually removing the stumbling-blocks.

THE TEACHER, Thomas Ham-mel, 30, reports on his new assignment Dec. 7. He is presently teaching in the Van Dyke public schools, Warren, Mich.

Hammel brings with him the recommendations of bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Missouri and professional experience in journalism.

He was an artillery officer in the U.S. Army, most of the editor of the Kookuk County News, Skourney, Ia. He was also employed by the Missouri Press association.

'Real Values' - Theme of Conference

CRANBROOK—Values for Reality will be discussed at the fourth annual Lake Erie Religion Conference sponsored by Cranbrook and Kingswood Schools, Nov. 20 through 22.

Nancy Kussrow of the Kingswood faculty and Walter H. Young, Cranbrook School chaplain, have announced the speakers and program.

INVITED ARE junior and senior students and their advisers from 17 independent schools in Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia and Buffalo, N. Y. Miss Kussrow said that about 40 delegates are expected.

Delegates will hear three talks by the Rev. Edward Roth, chaplain to Episcopal students at the University of Michigan, and one by Dr. William E. Mayer, psychiatrist and director of Hawaii Mental Health Service, Department of Health, Hilo, Hawaii.

Dr. Mayer's lecture, "American Youth Under Stress" is open free to the general public and will be at 8 p.m. Friday at the Cranbrook school auditorium. Based on a special Army study which he made, Dr. Mayer will discuss the Chinese Communist indoctrination of Americans captured during the Korean War and the significance of his findings as they relate to American education.

PANEL members for the conference are Father Edward Peters of the Newman foundation, Wayne State university; Dr. Franklin Wallin, assistant professor of history; Wayne; Rabbi Sherwin T. Wine of Temple Beth El, Detroit; and Ray Fenner, pastor at the Birmingham Congregational church. They will register Friday afternoon at Cranbrook school and then meet for dinner there, followed by Dr. Mayer's lecture.
