Without a Permit—Fences Aren't Legal

BEVERLY HILLS—Don't fence yourself in without a permit, the Village of Beverly Hills warned residents Monday night. You could get a ticket, for it's against the law. So is the installation of outdoor lamp posts without a permit.

Councilman Hugh G. Allerton, Jr. told the village council that "fences are going up every day." Still, he said, only two home owners have applied for permits since an ordinance requiring permits was passed last spring.

At the same time Allerton asked for and got a motion from the village council upping the fence permit fee from \$1 to \$2.50. Village Electrical Inspector Alex W. Leskiewicz said also that permits are not being taken out prior to installation of lamp posts. A \$5 fee is charged for the electrical permit required by village ordinance before installation of any such electric wiring.

THE FEE pays for inspection of the wiring once it is installed. The inspection assures that the wiring is installed safely. It is also available for fire insurance reasons, Leskiewicz said.

The village fence ordinance was passed last spring to prevent erection of unsightly fences which residents object to. It regulates height, material, and placement of fences.

To obtain a fence permit, residents must submit a rough sketch of their lot, showing that the fence will not farther extend in front than the rear line of the house. An official of the housing civic association must

initial the sketch.

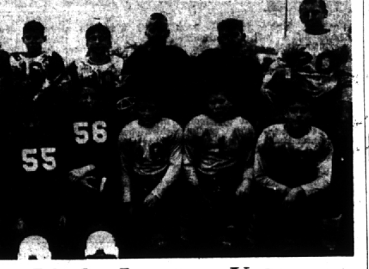
THE ADDITIONAL fee approved for fence permits is to pay inspection costs.

On the electrical inspections, Councilman Chester F. Guimont emphasized, "Our object in requiring electrical inspection in the village was to protect the safety of the individual. It was not to be a party to forcing a home owner to hire an electrician to do the job."
