Holiday Bazaar Features Goodies

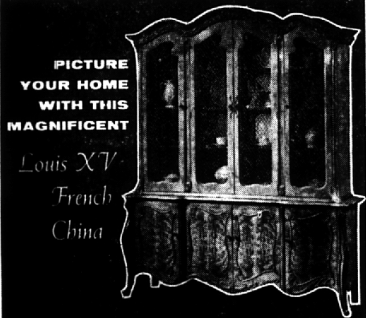

IN KEEPING with the season's festive atmosphere, the entertain-

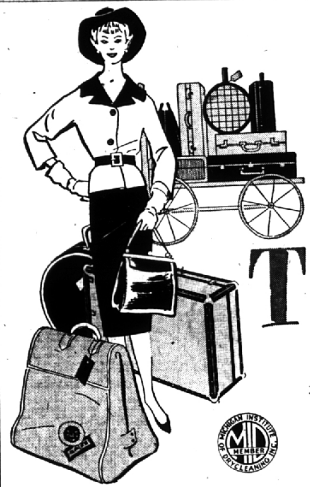
