In Oakland County... Citizens Condemn Waste, Says Oakland Congressman

Oakland County residents approve of the labor reform bill passed by Congress earlier this year, but are fed up with waste in Federal programs and projects. These are the conclusions of Congressman William S. Broomfield (R-Oakland county) who has just completed a six-week swing through his Congressional district in a house trailer office.

Broomfield said that "almost everyone" thought Congress was right in passing the labor reform law to protect members from corruption and misuse of power by some union officials. "But a number of workers thought that one provision of the new law ought to be changed," said Broomfield. "They thought that the bonding requirements for union officials was too strict and would work a hardship on small unions. They have a point, and this matter should be considered by the House education and labor committee next year."

Broomfield's third annual trailer tour to 35 communities also turned out a great deal of opposition to free-wheeling spending programs, he said. "Waste in such fields as farm subsidies and in lavish new buildings for the House and Senate are getting under the taxpayer's skin," said Broomfield. "These people want to see some results from the vast amount of money they contribute to the Federal government."

Many favored Broomfield's bill to abolish the farm subsidy program and a return to free market conditions in agriculture. They urged abolition of the huge multi-billion dollar farm surplus stocks "so that more money won't be poured down a rathole."

OTHERS urged Congress to look to its own backyard and asked why luxurious new Senate and House office buildings are either completed or now under construction. "All I could tell them was that the buildings were authorized before my time, that I have fought further expansion of these buildings but so far without much success."

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Proposing the laws which they will seek from the Michigan state legislature to streamline Oakland county operations, the county supervisors' legislative committee has run into a snag.

The committee of county lobbyists finds that the legislation it seeks may be contrary to the recommendations of the county auditor or John L. Carey's committee.

Carey leads a committee on Oakland county government reform, set up two years ago to recommend ways to eliminate some of what he calls the county's "excess government."

Carey, of Springfield township, is an adamant spokesman for county home-rule. He said last week that his committee is preparing a "progress report" to be delivered in December.

Few recommendations have been made to date by Carey's committee.
