Special Tests, Fence OK'd by School Board

SOUTHFIELD—The fence requested by residents adjoining Northbrook school on the west was approved Monday night by the Southfield board of education. The board accepted a \$1,126 bid for the fencing. It will be placed on the school property line, subject to approval of the school attorney.

In other action, board members gave their approved two day special testing of Southfield high school students. The tests will be conducted through the University of Pittsburgh, operating "Project Talent" with the support of the U. S. office of education.

Southfield was one of 1,000 American high schools selected for the tests designed "to fill a national need for facts regarding identification, development, and utilization of human resources."

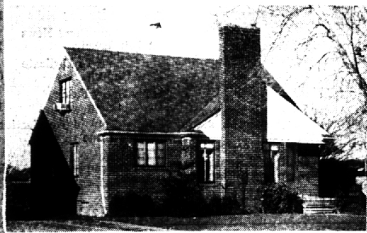

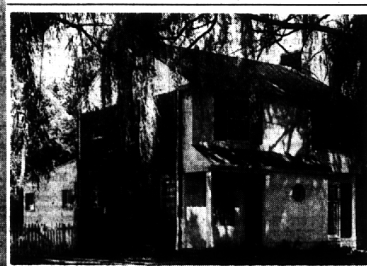
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18-year-old Nabs Deer First Day of Season

Court Grants Delay In Alyea Appeal

SOUTHFIELD — A 90-day adjournment was granted last week by Circuit Judge William John Beer in the hearing on a motion for a new trial for Raymond L. Alyea, 37, convicted slayer of a Southfield nursery night watchman.

Alyea is serving a 7-15-year term for manslaughter in the scissor slaying of Anthony Jasinski, 51, on Aug. 1.

The new trial motion charged the conviction was based on "insufficient and circumstantial evidence."

S'field Approves Water Unit Plans

SOUTHFIELD — A \$633,300 water transmission system will be under construction next year in Southfield with late summer set as the completion deadline.

Spalding DeBecker, Birmingham, the city's consulting engineers, were given the go-ahead Monday from councilmen to proceed with final engineering plans.

Construction will start on Nine Mile road and Telegraph. Ultimate plans call for main transmission lines on all main city roads.
