**Cannot Handle Artesian Drain, DPW Determines**

BEVERLY HILLS — Word has been received from the Oakland county department of public works that it cannot work on the proposed Beverly Artesian drain project. Village Manager Robert E. Murphy said last week.

"The project must go through the drain commission, or the village could do it on its own, letting a contract for the construction work," said Murphy.

Murphy said the next move is to check with the county on what action can be taken.

RESIDENTS of the Beverly Artesian subdivision in Beverly Hills have petitioned for improvement of the drain to relieve flooding in the 12 Mile-Pierce area. The village had hoped that the county DPW, acting under a special state law which facilitates action, could handle the \$185,000 project.

Southfield and Lathrup officials and organizations, Southfield school board member John G. Campbell had strongly urged Lathrup's participation with Southfield's library which will open Jan. 1 at Evergreen and 11 Mile.

Based on equalized valuations for the two cities, Campbell said he thought Lathrup should pay 10 per cent of what Southfield pays for the library, or an estimated \$5,500 in 1960.

But Monday night Hanson said, "We couldn't even pay \$1,000 a year. We don't have it."

THE WATER rate increase from \$2.05 per thousand cubic feet to \$2.26, becomes effective Jan. 1. The city's budget and budget committee recommended an increase to \$2.30. But council members stalled at the extra ten cents because adjustments will have to be made later next year to cover sewage disposal rates and water system engineering changes.

At the recommendation of the Michigan state department of health, the city will spend \$1,500 for an engineering survey of the water system. Certain dead end lines will be corrected for a better circulation of water and a fund will be set aside for major repairs on the 50 year old system.

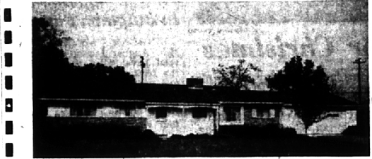

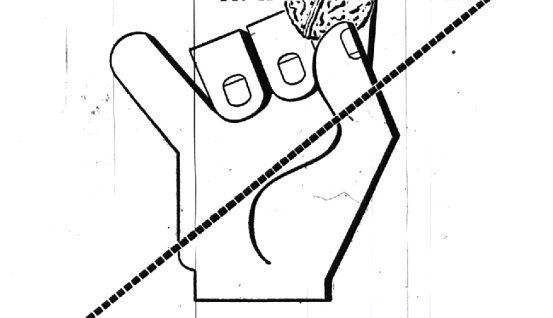
