Hunters Cause Protest Again

WEST BLOOMFIELD—The seasonal problem of hunting within West Bloomfield township has come up again this year.

A letter from Houseman-Spitzy real estate company to the township has focused the township's eye on the situation, which still has much open acreage to attract hunters.

The Houseman-Spitzy letter charges that real estate sales are being lost when prospective home owners find hunters trespassing subdivision limits and shooting on various property across from residences.

FOR THREE YEARS, the township has attempted to get a bill passed in the state legislature prohibiting hunting within township limits.

Each year the bill has died in committee because of opposition from the state conservation department. The department takes several surveys of townships to determine whether it agrees that a township is too populated to allow hunting.

Township officials will endeavor a fourth time to get a no-hunting

bill passed this year. They urge township residents, who are interested in its passage, to get behind the bill.

Residents Object, Foxcroft Lateral Nixed by B'field

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—At a special hearing preceding 12 regular township board meeting Monday night, a sewer lateral for a part of Foxcroft subdivision was rejected.

The decision was reached when 12 residents of the subdivision objected to participation in the cost. Objections were on grounds that they had new homes whose purchase price included cost of septic systems which were operating perfectly.

The original petition, accepted by the board earlier this month, was signed by owners of more than 60 per cent of land to be served by the lateral. However, a breakdown of the figures revealed that signers included ownership of 22 out of 24 vacant lots, and only 12 out of 32 home owners had signed the petition.

Since the majority of home owners objected, the board decided in their favor.

Ask Street Lights For Berkshires, Birmingham Farms

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—Lighting in township subdivisions listed most of the Bloomfield board agenda Monday. An additional telephone trunk line for township hall was also approved by the board.

The board accepted petitions for street lights in Birmingham farms subdivisions, and the Berkshire area.

Requests proposed for installation in Birmingham Farms would be at Telegraph and Cedarbrook, Telegraph at Sandiwood and Maple at Woodbank.

BERKSHIRE lights would be installed at Lincoln and Telegraph, Birmingham and Fourteen Mile, Haber and Fourteen Mile, and Lincoln and Lusher.

First hearing on the two projects was set for 7 to 9 p.m. Dec. 14.

The telephone trunk line, along with a call-expediting installation, will cost the township an additional \$140 per month. It is expected to facilitate communications, particularly fire calls.

Service Club Holds Telephone Bridge

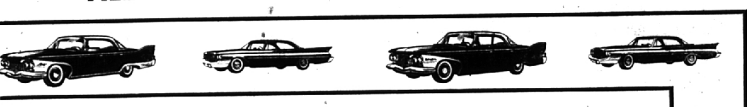
WESTCHESTER—Westchester women's social service club held a telephone bridge Nov. 19 to benefit the Oakland county infirmary.

Library Board, W. B'field to Meet For Budget Talks

WEST BLOOMFIELD—After examining a tentative budget for operation of West Bloomfield's public library next year, the township board voted last week to ask representatives of the library board to appear before the township board to review budget figures.

The tentative budget for 1960 totalled \$24,780, an increase of approximately \$500 over the cost of this year's operation.

Members of the township board agreed they would like to ascertain reasons for certain increases.

BUDGET FOR the library is voted on for approval by residents of the township at the annual township meeting in the spring.

However, legally, the library is required to submit tentative budget to township officials by the preceding November. If the budget is approved by the township board, it then submitted to the electorate as a part of the overall township budget.
