So far this year, there have been a good deal of records that could be contenders for best seller honors. Frankie Avalon puts in his two votes with "Wenus" and "Just Ask Your Heart" while Bobby Darin is a likely candidate with his current smash, "Mack the Knife" and "Dream Lover". "A Teen Ager In Love" by Dion and Belmonts was extremely popular a couple of months ago, and "Charles Brown" "Along Came Jones" and "Poison Ivy" will all be high on the list. Earlier in the year, "The All American Boy" by Bill Parsons, "Donna" by the late Ritchie Valens, "The Diary" by Neil Sedaka, and "Slagger Lee" by Lloyd Price were all big hits.

The album sellers for the year of 1959 have been a closely knit group of Johnny Mathis, Frank Sinatra, Ray Conif, Mitch Miller, Duane Eddy, "Peter Gunn", the Kingston Trio, Ahmad Jamal and Martin Denny. While the best selling record has been Henry Mancini's "Peter Gunn," the most recorded music was "Porgy and Bess." All major versions sold well.

Although "Don't Take the Stars by the Mystic" is starting to sell slightly, I think that "So Tenderly" will begin to move. This group, who recorded "Hushabye," is another one of the many Dion-influenced singing groups.

Fabian has out a new gem. It is unrarable because it would get about a B as far as commercial value is concerned and an Ein musical value. The song is called "Hound Dog Man," from a movie of the same name.

The other side of "Mr. Blue," "You Mean Everything to Me" is really starting to sell in some areas. "High School U.S.A." by Lloyd Price was the hottest single in the nation. Watch out for "Come In To My Room" by Lloyd Price on ABC Paramount. It's one of his best.
