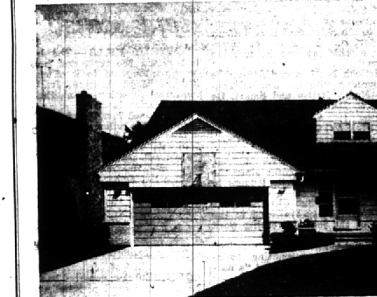
What's a "would have"? Well, a "would have" is all the hours Franklin church women would have spent sewing, making and baking things for a real bazaar this summer.

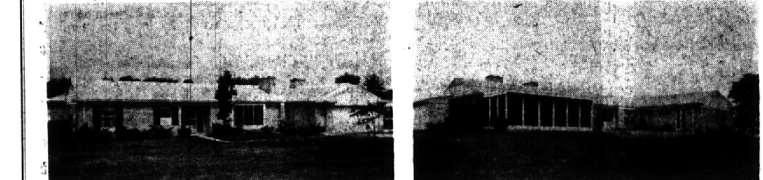
