Directors, Patrons Named For Holy Name Art Show

Directors and patrons have been named for a national exhibition of contemporary American religious art to be sponsored Oct. 15 through 26 by Holy Name Parish of Birmingham. Requests for exhibition space by high-ranking artists and craftsmen indicate the show may be the largest of its type ever held in the United States.

Rev. Eugene Paddock, pastor of Holy Name, and chairman of the exhibition, in naming his aides, explained the purpose of the exhibition. "There have been few such exhibitions of contemporary religious art in the United States," he said, "and these have been confined to museums with their naturally restricted patronage. In establishing such an exhibition at the parish level we feel we are helping to broaden the audience for such art and, perhaps, re-establishing the artist's awareness that the Church gratefully includes his skills and talents in its worship, as useful and meaningful to their spiritual growth."

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First Baptist Initiates New Youth Program

The fall semester of the "University of Life" will open for young people of the Birmingham community Oct. 4, at the First Baptist church. Dean Robert Boltwood announces the seminar, consisting of a series of discussions on subjects selected by the young people themselves. It will continue for six successive Sunday evenings.

The "University of Life" program is the development of a project originated by the Hennepin Avenue Methodist church of Minneapolis a few years ago. It was transplanted to Birmingham in Detroit by the First Baptist Church minister, Dr. Homer Armstrong during his tenure at the Jefferson Avenue Baptist church of Detroit.

The young adult series will be "Great Religions of the World." Outside speakers from other faiths representing the lectures include Rabbi Milton Rosenbaum of the Oak Park Congregation, the Rev. Dr. Arthur Lovely of the University of Detroit on Oct. 18 and 25 respectively.

The series will be initiated Oct. 4 by Leo Bingley of the Detroit Round Table of Christians and Jews. Other speakers will be exchange students representing the Hindu, Buddhist and Islamic faiths.

The high school series will present "Love, Courtship and Marriage." Discussion leaders, experts in youth work and problems, are being scheduled.

THE JUNIOR HIGH program is built around "Boy and Girl Relations." Typical of the lectures are such subjects as "What to Do When 'There's Nothing to Do' based on youth's perpetual problem of leisure-time activities, and "How to Get Along With Others." Directing the series will be William De Fretes, principal of Scofield school in Warren.

The juniors, fifth and sixth grades, will go "Around the World in Six Hours" and visit their young brothers and sisters in "far-away places with strange-sounding names."

EACH EVENING'S program will consist of a get-acquainted recreational period from 5 to 6 p.m.; "chupper" (refreshments) 6-6:30 p.m.; Vespers 6:30-7 p.m., and the educational program itself from 7:30 p.m. "Chupper" fee will be 35 cents weekly.
