City Adopts New Civil Defense Plan

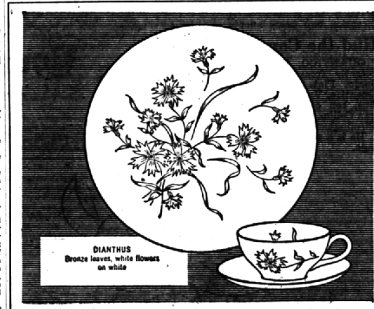
City commissioners have adopted the Michigan Civil Defense survival plan.
