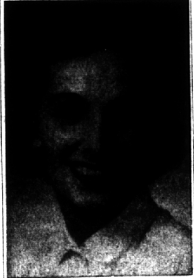

Off to Lansing

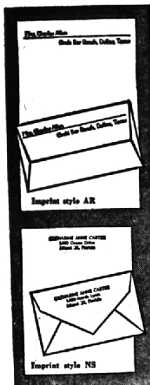
