## Upper Teens Club Slates Fund Drive For New Building

**SOUTHFIELD**—A goal of \$15,000 has been set by the Upper Teens Club of Southfield in their Oct. 2-3 fund drive.

The club has plans to build on leased acreage on Nine Mile road, just west of Telegraph.

The new home will cost about \$18,000. It will contain an office area, a miscellaneous recreation area and a special physical education or multipurpose room. The building was designed by Gilbert Savage, a member of the Southfield city planning commission.
