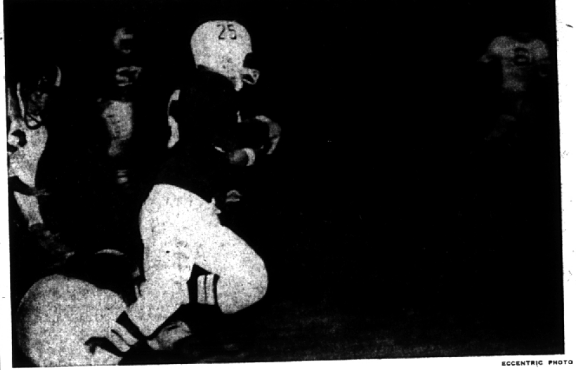
THE MAPLES continued their aggressive play in the third period as they covered 60 yards in scoring the touchdown.
