'San Quentin' Case Finally Reaches Council

LATHRUP—Three trees, some nice green grass and a few posts are the only things left of the San Quentin Adverse Possession on the Lathrup acreage for over a year. City Attorney Everett Hays said last week that there was a chance to remove the trees, keep the trees and make everyone concerned happy with a simple waiver from property owners renouncing adverse possession. A continuation of San Quentin, the attorney constitutes a hazard with trees and posts said Councilman Frederick Johnson. HE FAVORED removal of the trees and posts but leaving the lawn until the city decided to cut the road through. The Councilwoman Elizabeth Mitchell was all for putting the street through for fire and police purposes, but city funds must be watched, said Mayor Richard N. Cogger last winter weather damage existing roads beyond the city's budget. Hays was authorized to get the waiver from the property owners with an understanding that the trees may be put in full use if it is deemed necessary or at the time the storm water program is put through.
